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Course Description

"Witnessing Contemporary African Society" is an intensive, interdisciplinary course designed to give students exposure to and an overview of South Africa's history and culture. Course activities and assignments include visits to townships, historic sites, neighborhoods and museums, meetings with community leaders, lectures from local academics, and participation in community service projects. The course is a **one-credit course** and it also satisfies the Beyond the West (BW) requirement in Wheaton College's Foundation courses.

Participation Abroad (20%)

The January program to South Africa is <u>not</u> a tourist excursion and attendance and active participation in all lectures, visits and community service activities are essential and will be evaluated. Because writing your reactions about your experiences abroad facilitates substantive participation, we strongly encourage you to journal regularly throughout the trip. Journaling aids you in processing your impressions and perceptions, formulating opinions about your experiences, and honestly exploring your feelings about your interactions and experiences. The journals will be submitted for review and feedback during and after the trip.

Critical Review of Nelson Mandela's A Long Walk to Freedom (15%)

To demonstrate your understanding of the history of South Africa's struggle for political, economic, and social equality, you will be required to read Mandela's autobiography, *A Long Walk to Freedom*, during the holiday break and submit a **four-page (minimum and maximum)** critical review of it at our departure. This review should argue a thesis about how Mandela's childhood and experiences at Robben Island shaped his views about leadership, equality, and justice. **The critical review is due on January 4, 2018. Please save it to a flash drive if you can't print a hardcopy.**

Research Paper (20%)

The goal of the research paper is to explore contemporary social, economic, political or artistic themes and issues. Your paper should use at least three references from scholarly publication and journal articles. You may incorporate your experiences and conversations that you have with residents to provide context and interpretation to the themes in your research paper. You are expected to abide by the Wheaton College Honor Code. Your research paper must be 6-8 pages. An electronic copy or hard copy of your paper is due no later than 5 p.m. on March 1, 2018. Late papers will be assessed a 10 points penalty for each day past the due date.

Digital Story Telling (2-Person Group Project) (25%)

Each group of two students will prepare and present a 5-to-8-minute digital story based on their experiences and pictures/images during the trip. **The presentations will take place on February 21, 2018**.
